Even though he came from a difficult Buddhist home, it was evident upon his arrival that he had a great hunger to hear about God, to experience God's love, to learn to pray and read the Bible.

It's marvelous to see him witness! He tells Bible stories to children at school and is eager to share God's love with his classmates.

What a joy it was several months ago when Chai-Hau asked if he



could be baptized! I asked him whether he truly understood what it means to be baptized. He did. I then told him he would need his mother's permission for baptism. This would be a step of faith. He had great assurance, however, that God would work in his mother's heart and asked me and many others to pray.

Just before Christmas, **Chai-Hau** called his mother to ask for her consent. Miraculously she agreed, though she herself would not attend. On January 25, 2014, **Chai-Hau** was baptized in our *Bethesda* chapel. This was not only an important day for him, but also for the entire *Bethesda* family. Our residents and staff were touched by the clear and concise answers he gave to the pastor's questions regarding his faith in our Lord Jesus. Living in the countryside in a world of natural beauty, I, Esther, like to collect and create crafts made from nature. Last year someone asked me to teach a crafts class for adults. At first I declined, but after praying about it I changed my mind.

Last Spring we began with an
Easter wreath. I wanted to share the
true meaning of Easter. After

finishing the craft, we gathered to read the Easter story. I didn't really know what the women thought about our study, as many just came to learn crafts.

At the next class, a non-Christian woman asked if there was not going to be a Scripture lesson that day. I was ashamed to admit that I thought we should skip the Bible study. The Holy Spirit corrected me through the words of this non-believer, and so I read aloud about the flowers of the field. Jesus describes them as being so beautiful that "not even King Solomon in all his glory clothed himself like one of these" (Luke 12:27). We worked on flower-shaped lanterns that day.

About five people now come regularly every month. In the autumn we made a horn of plenty, formed from moss and filled to overflowing with fruits and flowers. John 1:16 was the verse for that day: "For from his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace."

A lady I met at the local gym came for the first time. She now looks forward to the Scripture reading more than doing crafts! She even brought her neighbor. Eleven women came last December, five for the first time, and only one of them was a Christian. That day we learned that the Christmas color red reminds us of the blood of Christ shed so freely on the cross for us. "For this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:28).



At present, we consider moving to other rented facilities as we continue to save for our own building. The process of

Please pray for these people to come to know Jesus as their Savior. Do pray especially for my mother*, as she has begun studying the Bible together with me, and shows a real interest in things of the Lord.

Miss Kazue Tanaka, my new coworker, moved to Fukui in January. After seminary training, she completed an internship at our Tokyo church. Since Kazue was born and raised in an urban area, pray that she will adjust well to rural life. On March 2nd, our Sunday Worship Services will commence. Pray that we might be empowered to share His Word clearly, knowing that the Lord has many people in Fukui He wants to call to Himself.
