They have unique talents and interests. **Wen Guo** does wonderfully on the drums. When we meet for devotions, he slides himself off his wheelchair and onto the drum set stool, ready to accompany the time of praise and worship. **Cai Xiu** loves to study English and does well enough to carry on a conversation. She patiently and happily helps the other children when they have questions with their English homework.

They have unique ways of offering friendship and love. **Qiu Ting** is always writing notes. I've lost track of how many little notes have been slipped into my hand. On almost every note, she adds the English words, "I love you too." **Ying Ying** was concerned that I might be lonely. She suggested that I come live with her family group on the 3rd

floor. **Lin Chen** doesn't say much, but she always comes over to hold my hand.

They have unique relationships with God. **Jia Qi** nodded in agreement when her teacher suggested praying when the children felt afraid during an earthquake. Using sign language, she added that she didn't need to



feel afraid because if she were to die, she would go to heaven to be with Jesus.

I am a man of the city. I never raised crops. I never went out to sea. Yet farmers and fishermen hold a fascination for me. A farmer depends on things totally out of his control – rain, hailstorms, sunshine, heat waves, frost. Fishermen are at the mercy of their fickle partner, the sea.

### **Planning the Next Step**

Our church facilities are not huge. There are times when our Sunday morning worship service is crowded, especially during special celebrations or baptisms. Over the past several months some church members have suggested that we prepare for the eventual purchase of a larger facility. This is a huge task, an extremely expensive undertaking, and a potentially divisive issue, so we put this to prayer. Of late we have also been considering the spiritual health of our church, as well as the financial and logistical aspects of having our own facility, instead of renting. He is answering us by

leading in the direction of acquiring our own larger facility. Thus during our deacon's meeting last June we decided the time was right to announce the beginning of our Building Fund Campaign.

We don't know God's timetable, but we see Him working in our church and believe that He will lead in His time. Perhaps it will be a number of years before we are ready to make a purchase, but we will wait until we are



financially able to make the move. In the interim, we have already decided that if the Lord adds 10 to 15 more people to our church, we would then have to rent a larger facility, while still saving for our own place. If we have more people, then we will have the financial resources to afford a significant rental increase, while still contributing to the building fund. He is stretching our faith!

Looking back we remember the faithfulness of God as He enabled our church to expand our facility from one unit to two, as the need arose. It came about as a neighboring tenant in our same complex relocated, leaving that unit vacant. Our landlord immediately offered it to us, as we were his first choice for occupancy. We were even permitted to add a door connecting these two units, thus solving our space problems. How able our Lord is to work out the logistics of His church! We trust Him now for even greater things in the future, knowing, "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain..." (Psalm 127:1). Thank you all for praying for and with us, and for your continuous support.
