Open Doors Among Thai Migrant Workers in Taiwan

Traditional Buddhist people groups (Hinayana or "small chariot") are a great challenge to the Christian church. Less than 0.3% of their number are Christians. It is very difficult to reach them with the Gospel. Among the 25 million Thai

in Eastern Thailand, less than 0.05% are Christians! In that area the Christian faith is seen as a dangerous Western cult. In the poorest and most conservative part of Thailand, Thais are deeply bound both to Buddhism and to evil spirits.

Some 70,000 Thai migrant workers are in Taiwan today, 40,000 of whom are from Eastern Thailand . Here the Lord has opened a wide door for them. More than 1,200 have come to faith in Christ. Many of them are the very first Christians in their village or district. By faith their lives have been radically changed. Because their working contract in Taiwan is only for two years, most have already returned to Thailand. There they spread the Gospel and help build up churches. About 250 of these saved Thai Christians are still in Taiwan and presently are helping us build up ten Thai churches.



An example of such a Thai believer is Mr. Suriya. He was deeply bound to alcohol and was without hope. By faith in Christ he was set free and became a joyful Christian. In his clan, he has become the first believer. Todav he is a fervent coworker in one of the Thai churches. Though he had been computer illiterate, he now has acquired much knowledge and skill in that field, so that he is the expert trouble shooter to solve computer problems in the Thai churches. Like some twenty other new Thai Christians, he studies

theology at Bangkok Bible Institute by extension. Beside his weekly 80-100 hour work load at the factory and much ministry in the Thai churches, he averages 15 credits each semester.

Please continue to pray for this ministry to Thai workers in Taiwan. We thank each of you for your fervent prayer and support!

These words were found in the Moravian Daily Text on March 24, 2013, greeting us on Palm Sunday. It was an unforgettable day of God's goodness. Two years ago we had planned a baptismal service on Easter Sunday for Hiroko, the sister of our Sister Gudrun Tate. It had to be

cancelled because of the objection of another family member. We now thank all you intercessors that helped pray.

Often we were concerned about the condition of Hiroko. Would she still be able to experience baptism, because of her ongoing Parkinson's disease and slowly increasing dementia? At times we were saddened and sometimes doubtful of her ability to confess her faith in Christ through baptism.

At the beginning of this year Hiroko fell in her room and broke her hip, requiring hospitalization and surgery. We often met there with her daughters, and our relationship with them became even closer. With a new concern for Hiroko's future, we fervently prayed and committed her again to God. HE was merciful and Hiroko came through the operation so well that she was able to return home after six weeks.

One day I felt an inner urgency to visit Hiroko together with Sister Gudrun. It was a special day of grace. She expressed again her desire to be baptized, for she wanted to spend eternity in heaven, looking forward to the reunion with her

dear parents who had also trusted in Jesus for their salvation. Both of Hiroko's daughters consented to her baptism and were present on that Palm Sunday morning. What a joy it was for all present! Only their unbelieving brother was not present. We keep on praying for him, asking the Lord to meet him and save him, too.

Hiroko's daughters, Mayo and Rumi, also need our prayer. We are waiting on the Lord to see how He will reveal Himself as Savior and Redeemer in their lives, too. Do join us in prayer! How thankful we are for your intercession and support!

Yo Jiahui was raised by her widowed mother. Having lost her father, Yo's greatest fear was to lose her mother as well. About 8 years ago Yo's mother died suddenly of a heart attack. Yo didn't have a chance to say goodbye or to express her gratitude for all the time and energy her mother invested into her. In Chinese culture, doing wrong by your parents often leads to a state of depression and self-blame. It is a devastating burden to bear.

Two years ago Yo's kindergarten-aged son talked about a classmate of his who often mentioned Sunday school. That classmate

happened to be the son of one of our deacons. Because Yo's son wanted to attend Sunday school too, she began bringing him to our church.

Slowly Yo came to realize that she needed this God of whom she heard on Sunday mornings. She believed Matthew 1:21, which tells us that Jesus came to save his people from their sins. To Yo this meant He came to save her from the guilt and sadness she was carrying these many years regarding her mother's sudden death. Through God's Spirit working deeply in her heart, Yo realized there was a way out of her depression.

Yo was born again, but she was not yet ready to make a public confession of her faith. Although she completed our baptismal preparation course over a year ago, she feared disapproval of her baptism by her mother-in-law. Yo's husband had been attending church regularly since last fall and supported her decision to be baptized.

On April 21st our church had the great joy of witnessing the baptism of Mrs. Yo Jiahui. Her strong testimony spoke to those present and is a great example of how God himself heals us, gives us reason to live, and especially gives us reason to live for Him. Thanks for praying with us! 


