
We are likewise proud of Chuen-Long and Li-Shuei, who enjoy

## A Changed Heart

Li Chiray works as a physical therapist and often came into conflict with a certain co-worker who, in his mind, did not exhibit professional standards. This therapist made many mistakes and exerted very little effort. Their relationship gradually deteriorated. They even avoided

working together in the same room. When not on rotation with her, work was tolerable, but when they had to work together, it was most difficult. This situation upset Chiray and he looked forward to Sundays, when he would come to church and go home energized and feeling much better about the situation. By the middle of the week, however, it was back to the way it was before.

We encouraged Chiray to forgive and to accept people as they are, but the message was not getting through. He knew that becoming a Christian meant being regenerated, so he began taking this big problem to the Lord. He and his wife would pray together about it, but his prayer was that the co-worker would get another job. God didn't answer that prayer. Instead, He had something better in mind.

Shortly after Chiray was baptized, he discovered that his attitude toward the co-worker had changed; the intolerance was suddenly gone. He didn't know how or exactly when it happened, but now when he saw her, he didn't have negative feelings toward her. Her work performance didn't change, but since he wasn't her direct supervisor, it no longer mattered. Their relationship improved greatly and it was obvious to everyone. This is the power of the Gospel! Chiray sees all this as a special gift from God and is now in training to be a cell group leader in our church. May the Lord continue to change and transform Chiray,

making him a blessing to all.
